BACKGROUND

Science, technology and innovation (STI) are increasingly recognised as essential drivers of sustainable development, regional integration and international cooperation. As the world confronts complex and interconnected challenges - including climate change, biodiversity loss, food and water insecurity, global health threats, energy transitions and emerging technologies - there is a growing need for scientific knowledge to inform policy, support international cooperation and contribute to evidence-informed decision-making.

Recognising the critical role of science in addressing these challenges, the United Nations proclaimed the International Decade of Sciences for Sustainable Development (IDSSD) 2024–2033, which calls for strengthening the contribution of science to sustainable development through enhanced international cooperation, stronger science-policy-society interfaces, capacity development and inclusive scientific partnerships. The Decade underscores the importance of translating scientific knowledge into practical solutions that benefit society and contribute to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals.

In this context, science diplomacy has emerged as an important approach for strengthening the interface between science, policy and international relations. Through science diplomacy, scientific evidence can inform policy and diplomatic processes, diplomacy can facilitate international scientific collaboration, and scientific cooperation can strengthen dialogue and trust among countries. These interconnected dimensions are increasingly important for addressing transboundary challenges and advancing sustainable development.

For Eastern Africa, science diplomacy presents significant opportunities to strengthen regional cooperation, promote evidence-informed policymaking and enhance the contribution of science to addressing shared development priorities. While research capacity across the region continues to grow, many researchers and science professionals have limited opportunities to develop practical competencies in policy engagement, science communication, stakeholder engagement, negotiation and international collaboration. Recognising this need, the East Africa Regional Workshop (EARW) Series was established in 2024 to strengthen research capacity, proposal development and transdisciplinary approaches to sustainability challenges among researchers in Eastern Africa. Building on the achievements of the first two workshops, the third edition expands the Series into science diplomacy, equipping participants with the knowledge, practical competencies and regional networks needed to connect scientific research with policymaking, regional cooperation and international partnerships.

The **3rd East Africa Regional Capacity Building Training Workshop: Strengthening Science Diplomacy for Sustainable Development** is jointly organised by the International Science, Technology and Innovation Centre for South-South Cooperation under the auspices of UNESCO (ISTIC), Maseno University, Future Earth Africa Hub Leadership Centre (FEAHLIC), National Research Fund Kenya (NRF-Kenya), the National Commission for Science, Technology and Innovation (NACOSTI), Belmont Forum, Future Earth Africa Hub (FEAH), the National Research Foundation South Africa (NRF-SA), the Center for International Forestry Research (CIFOR), the International University Network on Cultural and Biological Diversity (IUNCBD), and the Ecosystem-based Programme for Integrated Climate Action Network (EPIC Network).

Through this partnership, the workshop seeks to strengthen science diplomacy capacity, foster regional and South-South collaboration, and cultivate a growing community of researchers and professionals equipped to translate scientific knowledge into evidence-informed policy, strengthen international partnerships, and contribute to sustainable development across Eastern Africa.

OBJECTIVES

The key objectives of the workshop are to:

1. Strengthen participants' understanding of the concepts, principles and practice of science diplomacy and its relevance to sustainable development and regional cooperation.
2. Develop practical competencies in science communication, policy engagement, stakeholder mapping, negotiation and consensus-building.
3. Enhance participants' capacity to translate scientific research into policy-relevant knowledge, evidence-informed recommendations and practical solutions.
4. Strengthen participants' ability to develop and sustain interdisciplinary, cross-sectoral and regional partnerships through science diplomacy.
5. Support participants in designing practical science diplomacy initiatives that can be applied within their institutions, countries and professional practice.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

Upon completion of the workshop, participants will be able to:

1. Explain the principles and practical applications of science diplomacy and their relevance to regional and global challenges.
2. Communicate scientific evidence effectively and apply stakeholder engagement, negotiation and consensus-building skills in science-policy contexts.
3. Translate research and technical knowledge into policy-relevant messages, recommendations and practical responses.
4. Identify and develop strategic partnerships to support regional cooperation and collaborative science diplomacy initiatives.
5. Develop an action and impact plan for applying science diplomacy within their institution, country or professional work.

Participants will leave the workshop with practical tools, regional networks and an individual action plan to advance science diplomacy within their institutions, countries and professional communities.

TARGET GROUPS

The workshop is designed for professionals across Eastern Africa who are engaged in research, policy, science advisory, and international cooperation, including:

- Researchers, academics and research managers;
- Government officials and policymakers;
- Science advisors, diplomacy practitioners and international cooperation professionals;
- Representatives from research institutions, science councils and non-governmental organisations; and
- Professionals working on regional and global sustainable development challenges, including climate change, health, biodiversity, food systems, water, energy and emerging technologies.

The workshop welcomes participants at all career stages and seeks to promote geographic, institutional and disciplinary diversity across Eastern Africa. Women and professionals from underrepresented groups are strongly encouraged to participate.

METHODOLOGY

The workshop adopts a participant-centred and practice-oriented learning approach that combines conceptual understanding with practical application. Designed to promote active learning and peer exchange, the programme integrates expert knowledge with real-world case studies, collaborative problem-solving, and experiential learning.

The methodology includes:

- **Interactive Lectures** – Expert-led sessions introducing the concepts, principles and applications of science diplomacy.
- **Country Presentations and Case Studies** – Sharing regional experiences and analysing real-world science diplomacy challenges to strengthen contextual understanding.
- **Practical Skills Development** – Hands-on exercises in science communication, policy engagement, stakeholder mapping, negotiation and policy brief development.
- **Simulation and Collaborative Learning** – Interactive negotiation simulations and a Collaborative Challenge Lab, where multidisciplinary teams develop practical recommendations to address regional science-policy challenges.
- **Reflection and Networking** – Facilitated discussions, participant reflections and networking opportunities to foster peer learning and regional collaboration.

The workshop emphasises interdisciplinary collaboration, experiential learning and the practical application of science diplomacy approaches to support evidence-informed policymaking and sustainable development across Eastern Africa.

PROGRAMME STRUCTURE
